

For the first time after several years we finally got a spot on the river / bay front in a Florence, Oregon RV park we had been trying to book for years. The new e-Bike is 54 pounds without the 9 pound battery. It turns out there were very few options for our requirements and such, but we found a couple that would work for us. Unfortunately, there were none locally. The nearest one we could find was in Corvallis, Oregon. We spent one day driving back and forth to Corvallis to get it. We had to assemble the bike rack in an adjacent parking lot of a restaurant but it all worked out okay. When we got back we disassembled the old bike rack so it would fit 'somewhere' until we got to Tucson where we could reassemble the bike rack and sell it, (which we did very easily).


