
PART VI: PNG TO NEW ZEALAND VIA AUSTRALIA

The last legs of our journey to New Zealand were from Papua New Guinea south to Australia (with stops in Cairns, Townsville, and Sydney), then east across the Tasman Sea to New Zealand. We stopped

at Bay of Islands as our first port of call in New New Zealand before our last port of call in Auckland where we disembarked the ship to begin exploring New Zealand by car, boat and train.

It took a couple nights and a day of cruising from Alotau, Papua New Guinea to make Cairns, Australia. The seas were calm and offered a nice sunrise or two along the way.

We were escorted in the Cairns Harbors and berthed in a nice central location to explore on our own.

The Cairns Botanical Garden is a large park with forests and wetlands that host many birds. 



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

That evening, under cover of another great sunset, we set sail for Townsville. It was just down the coast and an short overnight cruise.

At this port we did take one of the cruise line's excursions as they went to the Billabong Sanctuary, a place where we wanted to do some birding. It is some distance south of Townsville and we felt uncomfortable going that distance on own with the limited time available. The excursion would also take in a short stop at couple of Townsville locations that seemed interesting as well.

The Billabong Sanctuary is a 27 acre wildlife sanctuary south of Townsville. The sanctuary is a permanent home to over 70 species of Australian mammals, birds and reptiles. As well as many birds, there are kangaroos, wallabies, koalas, wombats, crocodiles, goannas. and meerkats from Africa. The natural billabong (lake) at the center of the sanctuary is host to many visiting animals, some of which will breed and raise their young at the sanctuary.



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The ship docked well into Sydney Harbor, at the White Bay Cruise Terminal. It was not walking distance to anything, but a free shuttle was provided to the downtown area we wanted to visit. The docking spot, while some distance from the downtown area the really big ships get to dock at, provided us with some nice views of the city over the two days we were there.







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In Sydney, the ship jettisoned garbage and took on supplies for the journey onward. The view to the right is from over the railing on one of the ship's upper decks looking down at the loading activity.

We left Sydney on an overcast late afternoon but it still provided for some more interesting scenes of Sydney and the suburbs.





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As this A380 plane passed overhead, it was a bit odd to think that depending upon the plane's configuration there probably were nearly as many passengers on that plane as there were on this ship. As many as 850 in the 230' x 21.5" x 2 decks tall of an A380 and as many as 670 passengers and 400 crew in the 600' x 83' x 11 decks tall of the ship we were on.

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It was another three nights and two days of cruising east across the Tasman Sea before we would round the northern tip of New Zealand and make a stop at the Bay of Islands.



We didn't go ashore because in just a few days we were going to spend five days here on our own. It will be our first stop after getting our rental car and supplies in Auckland. Instead we spent the day enjoying the views from the ship and getting ready for our exit in Auckland in a couple days.





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With our arrival in Auckland, we completed our journey to New Zealand... from Poulsbo to Los Angeles via car and then Los Angeles to Auckland via ship along the edges of the Pacific Ocean. For the next four months we explored both the North Island and South Island of New Zealand, primarily car, but occasionally by water and rail. In the end, we pretty much circumnavigated both islands. The next several *Flying Pig Adventures* travelogues will be about those travels, but publishing them will be a bit slower than normal as we plan to move to a new home over the next few months.
